

Privacy

The Privacy Policy has been developed to address the Ludwig Institute for Cancer Research compliance with the:

- Privacy Act 1988; as amended by the Privacy Amendment (Private Sector) Act 2000 (Commonwealth)
- Information Privacy Act (State) 2000; and the Health Records Act 2001

This legislation regulates the way organisations can collect, use, keep secure and disclose personal information. The Act gives people the right to know why an organisation is collecting their personal information, what information is collected, how it will be used and who has access to that information. The Ludwig Institute for Cancer Research has adopted the ten Information Privacy Principles (incorporating the National Privacy Principles) and will follow these Principles and the Acts.
